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## English language varieties in Shaw's Pygmalion

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## **Abstract**

Everything around us is in a state of change and movement: living creatures, matter, energy, earth, technology, and languages, too. Because everything that is created develops and changes, language is also created as a communication tool that changes over time.

In this paper, a thorough analysis is made to describe these changes. For this purpose, George Bernard Shaw's play Pygmalion, written more than a hundred years ago, is used as a case study to show how language is represented, by focusing on differences between the language used by the lower working class, considered as non-standard, and the language used by the upper middle class, which tends to belong to the overt prestige form, or standard English. A corpus was built in order to analyse the language used in Shaw's Pygmalion, the distinctive features of the language varieties of the different classes and the semantic shift of the words in the corpus.
